# MCN ANNOUNCES RESERVATION PROTECTION COMMISSIONERS

MCN ASSEMBLES ALL NATIVE MVSKOKE RESERVATION PROTECTION COMMISSION TO ADVISE AND DEVELOP POLICY TO SUPPORT SOVEREIGNTY

OKMULGEE, Oklahoma-On July 29 Principal Chief Hill signed Executive Order 20-03. The order establishes the Mvskoke Reservation Protection Commission. According to the order press release, the commission is already in place and at work.

While the State of Oklahoma has formed a commission with little or no tribal representation, the Muscogee (Creek) Nation has exclusively populated its commission with tribal citizens.

The order states that Principal Chief Hill will serve as Chairperson and will request that the Commission provide reports, including findings and recommendations, on any Executive Orders, National Council Resolutions, or other governmental actions that need to be taken to

ensure the public health, safety, and welfare of all of those living, or seeking to do business, within the MCN Reservation borders.

Another duty of the Commission will be its role in collaborating with other governmental sovereigns including federal, tribal, state, county, and municipality authorities, to ensure criminal, civil adjudicatory, and civil regulatory jurisdictional issues are addressed through mutual understanding and cooperation across the many jurisdictions that currently exist in eastern Oklahoma.

On Aug. 10 the Executive branch announced the appointments to the commission. The commission is organized in nine separate categories with some commissioners being involved in more than one category depending on their backgrounds.

# FORMER MCN CHIEF SENTENCED TO PRISON

FORMER MCN PRINCIPAL CHIEF GEORGE TIGER WAS SENTENCED TO ONE YEAR IN PRISON FOR BRIBERY

MUSKOGEE, Oklahoma -Former Principal Chief of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation George Phillip Tiger (70) was sentence to one year and one day in prison for his involvement in a bribery case in which Tiger admitted to receiving federal funds. His charges stem from his time as a board member of the Economic Development Authority Board (EDA) for the Alabama-Quassarte Tribal Town (AQTT).

Tiger will serve his time in FMC Fort Worth, an administrative security federal medical center, a facility that can accommodate Tigers' health issues. In addition to his time prison, Tiger will have two years of supervised release, and will pay a \$10,000 fine. Tiger will report to serve his sentence on Sept. 14.

Tiger was an agent of the AQTT from September 26, 2017 through December 4, 2018. His duties included serving as the Chairman of the EDA Board. The AQTT formed the EDA to iden-

tify, plan, initiate, and develop tribal economic and industrial activities on behalf of the AQTT.

The Indictment to which Tiger entered his guilty plea alleged that from on or about September 26, 2017 through on or about February 15, 2019, stated he corruptly solicited, demanded, accepted and agreed to accept a bribe from Mr. Aaron Terry, intending to be influenced and rewarded in

connection with a transaction or series of transactions of the AQTT.

Mr. Terry held various executive management and control positions within the AQTTowned business entities. He pled guilty to one count of Theft by An Agent Of An Indian Tribal Government Receiving Federal Funds.

"Mr. Tiger took advantage of the position of trust he had been given by the people of the Alabama-Quassarte Tribal Town. Instead of acting in the best interests of those he was appointed to serve Tiger sought out and received unlawful profit for himself. Terry likewise exploited his position as an agent of a tribal government for his own selfish and unlawful gain." said United States Attorney Brian J. Kuester. "This office and the agencies who have been involved in this investigation are committed to identifying, investigating, and prosecuting those who corrupt the positions of trust and authority they hold."

"While serving as appointed officials within the Alabama-Quassarte Tribal Town, George Tiger and Aaron Terry engaged in various bribery schemes with the sole intention of personal financial gain," said Melissa Godbold, Special Agent in Charge of the FBI's Oklahoma City Field Office.

'The prosecution of these subjects should serve as a warning that law enforcement will not tolerate officials who abuse their positions of trust."

Tiger was able to address the Court. He asked if he could speak a few words in his native language. Accommodating indigenous language in the court was precedence for Judge White. Court record was required to be suspended for the few lines of the Mvskoke language since court reporters were not equipped to record and interpret the communications.

"I am deeply sorry to the leadership, citizens and family of A and Q," Tiger said. "I hope my error can be used to help others make the right decision even when others are not watching."

Fact-finding reports ransom paid for IT security incident.

OKMULGEE, Oklahoma -After a request of Muscogee (Creek) Citizen Dode Barnett the Muscogee (Creek) Nation (MCN) National Council (NC) Fact finding Committee has conducted and reported on their findings about IT security

*REPORTER* 

The request was submitted on May 22 and the findings released on Aug. 4 confirmed that a \$440,512.24 ransom was paid to recover the Tribe's IT servers.

incident in the form of a response

According to the letter, the security incident occurred on April 24.

The committee response said, 'Principal Chief and Executive Branch Officials indicated that there was a need to maintain confidentiality during the course of the investigation based upon legal advice.'

'Testimony revealed that the Administration officials were instructed not to disclose the information until the incident had relented and the negotiations were concluded,' the letter said.

In an earlier report from the Internal Affairs committee, IT was confirmed that word of the breach was mentioned on record in the May Business, Justice and Finance Committee meeting. That meeting's recording was altered before being published causing public outcry. It was later restored to its alleged original state.

Fact-Finding Committee was asked by Barnett to determine why the National Council was never notified of the ransom ware attack as it has been identified in the fact-finding response.

'Due to the confidential nature of the matter, some members of the National Council were informally notified of the issue on April 27 via teleconference,' the response said. 'Not all National Council Representatives however were able to participate in the teleconference.'

Fact-finding reported on the nature of the breach and the Tribes backup systems.

'The Nation's IT data was backed up; however, the attack was actually initiated through the back up storage process and then moved into the main data center of the Nation.'

In the report, the committee confirmed that the funds were paid to Coveware Inc., the Tribe's negotiators selected by the insurance company that handles such losses.

After Coveware Inc. transferred the funds to Mamba Group by bit

The authorization to transfer the funds came from Principal Chief David Hill.

According to subpoena testimony from the Nation's Controller Clay Darnell and Attorney General Roger Wiley, the funds were accessible to the Principal Chief's discretion under Title 37, Section 2-717(D) of the tribal code.

In response to Barnett's inquiry as to the legality of the transfer of funds, the committee said, 'No; we refer to the Nation's Constitution (see Article V, Section 3 and Article VI, Section 7(d)2) as confirmed by the Nation's case law (see Childers v. Bryant, CV-89-11, October 18, 1989 at 182) indicating the acts of the Executive Branch (including the Chief and the Controller) are: Only to perform the ministerial duty required in processing and paying appropriated budgeted claims.'

'The Legislative Branch has the Constitutional authority through the budgetary process to control government spending,' the report said.

The report confirmed that the tribe does have insurance that covers such incidents. That coverage allows for recovery of the funds expended on the ransom.

# MCN RAMPING UP JUSTICE POST SCOTUS

COUNCIL APPROVES A \$2.2M EXPANSION IN TRIBAL LAW ENFORCEMENT IN WAKE OF SCOTUS RESERVATION OPINION

OKLAHOMA CITY— The MCN National Council approved a supplemental appropriation for the MCN Lighthorse on Aug. 4 that would allow a substantial expansion for the department's staff after the recent SCOTUS opinion confirming the reservation boundaries of the MCN is still intact.

"What we are asking for is the supplemental budget to bring on 39 additional officers and support staff," Lighthorse Chief Daniel Wind said. "The department is giving 100% of their energy and it is taking a toll."

According to Wind, staff will include 10 investigators, 6 dispatchers, 20 officers, a clerk and two captains.

Wind said that the MCN Lighthorse has had to cover more area since the SCOTUS opinion.

"This will help us make sure our department does not get too overworked," Wind said.

In addition to the extra workload, Wind said his department has been impacted by COVID-19. Wind was actually in quarantine for COVID-19 attending the meeting remotely. Wind is not the only member of the department to have been affected.

Okfuskee District -Seat B Representative Travis Scott asked Wind if all his staff were currently patrolling and if the department had to incur a lot of overtime.

Wind said that the department is unable to do overtime pay. His department instead reimburses time with comp time.

"Everyone is definitely, lending a hand, it's particularly hard on our dispatch and records manager," Wind said.

Tulsa District-Seat B Representative Lucian Tiger III asked about the hiring process timeline of new officers.

Wind said that he estimated the staff onboarding could be complete within the next three months.

Rep. Tiger said that he was not in support of carrying the funds forward as the legislation allowed. He asked what amount of funding was needed to get the department through the remaining of FY 2019-2020 budget.

Wind said that had done figures for a backup plan to get the department through the next few months with less staff. But that with all the equipment, vehicles and supplies, and that if those funds were allocated the money would be expended within the next 60 days.

Principal Chief David Hill told the council that so far, each department other than, tribal courts, MCN Attorney General, Social Services, and MCN Lighthorse are being asked to make a ten percent cut to their budgets.

This adjustment would be used to offset the projected increased needs in the tribal courts, MCN Attorney General, Social Services, and MCN Lighthorse. He said the estimated shortfalls range from a low estimate of \$2M and a high estimate of \$10M.

Tukuputce District-Seat A Representative Anna Marshall asked about the cooperation between non-tribal agencies.

"Are you having a lot of cooperation between the local police departments and county sheriffs, are they able to help out," Marshal said.

Wind said that there was cooperation but some agencies that have not cross-deputized before or are new to cross deputation are unsure of how to proceed with calls and forward them to the MCN Lighthorse.

"We have been making the rounds during the week as much as we can to explain what is happening," Wind said. "Some of the smaller counties are still calling us and our mandate is to respond."

Wind said that daily his department is called out and then his department calls out the FBI.

In addition to the increase in staff with Lighthorse, other signs indicate that the tribe is bolstering its justice systems.

A new appointment to the judicial branch, increasing the interagency agreements between tribal law enforcement and state, county and cities, and new legislation for child welfare services are few of the areas the tribe is focusing its attention. Additionally, the Principal Chief has a set a commission to report on current needs and strategies.

One such interagency agreement for Lighthorse took place on July 16. Wagoner County Sheriff Chris Elliott met with Creek Nation Lighthorse Tribal Police Chief Daniel Wind to discuss the SCOTUS decision. The two entities discussed the plans for them to work together to provide law enforcement in the area's where their jurisdictions overlap.

For Wagoner County, the two agencies determined that the best way for the safety and security of the public to be maintained was

through cross deputation. 'While some subjects remain up in the air, one remains the same, Sheriff Elliott and the Wagoner County Sheriff's Office are committed to the safety and security of our citizens,' the sheriffs' statement said. 'To this end, all WCSO Deputies have been cross-deputized with the Creek Nation, and likewise the Creek Nation Lighthorse are being cross-deputized in Wagoner County.'

'This allows both agencies to work together seamlessly in keeping our people safe.'

While the tribe is early into the budgeting for the FY2020-21, there has been a preliminary estimation of what the cost of the sovereign justice system expansions could have on the tribe. Not all law enforcement agencies are as quick to enter into the collaborative agreements with the Muscogee (Creek) Nation.

The tribe has yet to make any agreements with any law enforcement agencies in Okmulgee Co. Mvskoke Media will continue to follow the impacts of the SCOTUS opinion reaffirming the MCN reservation boundaries and make updates as they become available.

# URGENT NEED FOR NATIVE AMERICAN FOSTER HOMES WITHIN MCN RESERVATION

MCN HOPES TO ENCOURAGE CITIZENS TO OPEN THEIR HOMES TO PROVIDE SAFE HOMES AND ADVOCATE FOR NATIVE AMERICAN FOSTER CHILDREN

OKMULGEE, Oklahoma -With each day that passes, there is a large fluctuating number of children within the Muscogee (Creek) Nation boundaries who are without a family or even a stable home.

The MCN Children and Family Services Administration want to make citizens aware of the urgent need for foster homes. According to Certification, Placement, Recruitment and Training Coordinator Robin Wind the program is in a dire need of foster homes.

"We currently do not have enough homes available to take on all the children in foster care within our reservation," Wind said. "With the latest data for 2020 there are currently 2,909 Indian children in foster care in Oklahoma and 863 of those children reside in the MCN reservation. Its also important to point out those numbers fluctuate

The purpose of the MCN CPRT program is to find tribal families to nurture and meet the needs of our MCN children who have been placed into custody by state or tribal courts. This program provides assistance in completing the application and will provide training for foster care providers while providing a stable, caring, and nurturing home for any Muscogee (Creek) child whose safety cannot be assured in their own home.

Although the McGirt v. Oklahoma case may have brought on changes to the MCN as a whole, Wind says there have not been any changes in the tribes foster care program particular to findings of the case.

"The need for foster families has always been huge," Wind said. "Any tribal child welfare systems including the state are always needing foster homes. The hope is for

our foster homes to grow to maintain the children in our reservation. Of course we need our citizens help to get there. As our homes increase, so will our program."

With the lack of foster homes most of the current foster homes are at a full capacity with minimal openings for children.

"There are currently 12 certified foster homes and of course that number also fluctuates when families adopt and then that home closes or when more homes are certified."

Citizens, or even those who live within the MCN reservation are encouraged to help in any way possible. This can include dropping meals by, care packages, supplies or anything a family might need to help provide for the children.

"We ask citizens to consider opening their homes to our children," Wind said. "Not everybody can do that so we ask them to be helpers to the families that they may know that are fostering and be

an advocate for foster care."

To become a foster care provider, a member of a federally recognized tribe living within the MCN reservation must be certified with MCN Children and Family Services Administration.

"A family member of a Muscogee (Creek) child can also be certified through our program if the child is staying in the home," Wind

The MCN Certification, Placement, Recruitment and Training Program provide what is needed to the family. The program provides healthcare assistance, childcare assistance, necessary counseling and parental training as well as a monthly reimbursement to help provide for the child.

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# OKLAHOMA NATIVE FILMMAKER GETS RECOGNIZED BY ACADEMY OF ARTS

STERLIN HARJO IS ONE OF 819 ARTISTS APPOINTED TO THE ACADEMY OF MOTION PICTURE ARTS AND SCIENCES

HOLDENVILLE, Oklahoma-Native filmmaker Sterlin Harjo recently was appointed into the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences.

The Academy invited more than 800 artists to join as members of the organization. The Academy is a professional honorary organization with the stated goal of advancing the arts and sciences of motion pictures.

Harjo, who is Creek and Seminole began filmmaking in his early 20's. His first two feature films were 'Four Sheets to the Wind' and 'Barking Water.' He then made his first feature documentary called, 'This May Be the Last Time' which premiered in 2014. He recently completed another documentary 'Love and Fury' which came out this year, but it was his feature film 'Mekko' which got him the invite to join the Academy.

"Mekko can be watched on Amazon Prime," Hario said. "Then Love and Fury is currently being shown on a couple of virtual film festivals."

Mekko is about a man who gets out of prison after 19 years and links up with some friends who are in a Native homeless community in Tulsa . He has to learn to survive living on the streets, and hardships he has to deal with and overcoming the hardships he has faced, explained Harjo.

When Sterlin is needing ideas for new films he thinks back on stories he grew up hearing. Harjo was surrounded by storytellers on his Native and non-native family sides. Both of his grandma's knew how to tell stories, and just from listening to those inspired him to write some of his films.

"I think it's very important to show native people in different light, and I think we've been represented badly in film or tv but I hope to change that," Harjo said.

The appointment to the Academy means Harjo will get a vote for future Oscar awards, according to the Oscars website. He follows after a few other Native

Americans who have also been appointed to the Academy.

"It was a really good honor because there is not a lot of us there representing Native people," Harjo stated of his appointment. "It shows them an amount of respect for my work and me. It also shows them the industry is changing and they have to be more inclusive because stories are becoming more diverse."

Now that Harjo and other Native producers or filmmakers are apart of the Academy it shows that the industry is interested in their work. He feels that others should be encouraged because there is a lot of work out in the world now in film.

Harjo is currently working on a television show pilot called 'Reservation Dogs' created by Harjo and Oscar winner Taika Waititi.

### Who are the Caregivers?

Anyone who provides care and/or support services for an older individual who, for reasons of illness or frailty, cannot manage independently without assistance.

Care givers can be adult children, spouses, partners, other relatives, friends, and neighbors. Grandparents or older relatives raising a child under the age of eighteen are also considered caregivers.

### **ELGIBILITY:**

- 1. Applicant must be 18 years or older and meet the definition of a family caregiver.
- 2. Elder must be age 55 years or older and unable to perform at least two activities of daily living.
- 3. Applicant and elder must reside within the Creek Nation service area.
- 4. Either the applicant or elder must be a member of a federally recognized tribe.

## **GRANDPARENTS RAISING GRANCHILDREN:**

- 1. Granparents or older relatives raising a child under the age of eighteen or a disabled adult, 19 54 years of age are also eligible.
- 2. Elder must be age 55 years or older and must reside within the Creek Nation service area.
- 3. Elder or child must be a member of a federally recognized tribe.
- 4. Elder must be the primary care provider of the child; however, legal guardianship is not required.

OKMULGEE, Oklahoma - A Muscogee (Creek) Nation Council Meeting was held July 23 via teleconference.

The National Council addressed the following legislation, the interpretation of which is attributed to language in the bills.

TR 20-114 Authorization of Principal Chief to execute memorandum of understanding between the Muscogee Depart-(Creek) Nation ment of Health (MCNDOH) and Oklahoma State Department of Health on behalf of the MCNDOH. Sponsored by James Jennings. Adopted 15-0.

The Oklahoma State DOH is preparing for the delivery of this vaccine by recruiting providers, like MCNDOH, who make up the infrastructure of vaccine storage and administration in Oklahoma to ensure vaccine administration can be implemented in a quick and efficient manner. MCNDOH desires to enter into the Memorandum of Understanding between the MCNDOH and the Oklahoma State DOH.

TR 20-115 Confirmation of the nomination of Jason Nichols to serve on the Muscogee (Creek) Nation citizenship board. Sponsored by Joyce Deere. Adopted 14-1. Voting 'No' was Representative Joseph Hicks.

The Council confirms the nomination made by Principal Chief of Jason Nichols to serve on the MCN Citizenship Board. Term will begin upon confirmation and will expire June 1, 2025.

TR 20-119 Authorization of Principal Chief to execute a memorandum of agreement between the United States of America Indian Health Service (IHS) and the Muscogee (Creek) Nation for the conimprovement, struction, installation, and rehabilitation of domestic water supply and wastewater disposal facilities for 18 Native American owned homes located within with Muscogee (Creek) Nation service area. Sponsored by Darrell Proctor. Adopted 15-0.

IHS will provide labor, materials, connection fees, equipment, and supplies necessary to construct all water supply and waste disposal facilities and contribute \$106,131.00 for the Project. The MCN will provide necessary easements, rights-of way, or other land interest deemed necessary as well as permit IHS representatives land access. The MCN will designate a project representative to coordinate the MCN's participation. MCN will provide assistance in complying with National Historic Preservation Act, the Native American Graves Protection Act, and the Repatriation Act. MCN will contribute \$199,999.00, funded from Nation's Comprehensive Annual Budget Indian Health Service Line, to be used with IHS funds.

TR 20-120 Authorization of Principal Chief to execute a contract with McCoy Roofing Company, LLC on behalf of Muscogee (Creek) Nation Department of Housing. Sponsored by Thomasene Yahola

Osborn. Adopted 15-0. MCN Department of Hous-

ing was awarded the 2018 Indian Community Development Block Grant. NCA 19-109 approved the expenditure of the funds. The MCN Department of Housing is requesting approval of a construction contract with McCoy Roofing Company, LLC for the rehabilitation of 34 apartment units located in Eufaula, OK. Principal Chief authorized to execute final documents necessary in the rehabilitation of the 34

apartment units. TR 20-121 Authorizing the construction of an electric charging station at the Muscogee (Creek) Nation headquarters in Okmulgee, OK. Sponsored by Darrell Proctor. Adopted 15-0.

The MCN Department of Environmental Service has received funds from Volkswagen as part of the Indian Tribe Mitigation Trust. The MCN Department of Environmental Services has developed a project to construct an electric charging station top promote electric vehicle use by the tribal administration, tribal citizens, and the general public. The cost to construct the charging station will be paid for from the Indian Tribe Mitigation Trust Funds in the amount of \$187,652.00.

TR 20-122 Approval and authorization of the Principal Chief to pursue all available 2.5 GHz band spectrum and licensing authority over eligible rural tribal areas of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation. Sponsored by Thomasene Yahola Osborn. Adopted 15-0.

The MCN needs to address the serious need for adequate public broadband and internet connectivity of the Nation and its citizens at a reasonable cost, and to provide administrative authority and oversight to deploy, operate, maintain and expand the use of 2.5 GHz band spectrum within the jurisdiction of the MCN. The National Council approves the Principal Chief to pursue licensing authority over eligible rural tribal areas for the 2.5 GHz band spectrums and to operate and manage the licensure on behalf of the Nation and also authorizes Chief to provide any necessary documents to the Federal Communications Commission in relation to acquisition of the licensure.

TR 20-124 Authorization of the Principal Chief to submit an application for participation in the National Flood Insurance Program with the Department of Homeland Security, Federal Emergency Management Agency. Sponsored by Charles McHenry. Adopted

Certain areas of the MCN are subject to flooding, causing serious damages to properties. Participation in the program will require the Nation to develop a flood plain management program and will allow the Nation to seek funding for the mitigation of lands within the Nation that flood or have potential of flooding.

TR 20-125 Authorization of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation Department of Housing to purchase and eight unit apartment complex in Coweta, OK for the purpose of rental housing. Sponsored by Charles McHenry. Adopted

Voting 'No' were Representatives Mark Randolph, Joyce Deere and Anna Marshall.

The MCN Department of Housing requests approval of the purchase from Truco Real Estate -Multi, LLC of the eight-unit complex for the price of \$875,000.00. The MCN Department of Housing will be utilizing the Indian Housing Block Grant CARES COVID-19 funding. To be purchased on or before July 30.

TR 20-127 Confirmation of the nomination of Skye McNiel to serve on the Muscogee (Creek) Nation Public Gaming Commission. Sponsored by Patrick Freeman Jr. Adopted15-0.

Skye McNiel will serve on the Muscogee (Creek) Nation Public Gaming Commission until the term ending on June 30, 2024.

TR 20-128 Confirmation of the nomination of Kevin Agee to serve on the Muscogee International LLC (MI, LLC) Board of Directors. Sponsored by Travis Scott. Failed 5-9-1. Voting 'No' were Representatives Lucian Tiger III, Joyce Deere, Patrick Freeman Jr, Joseph Hicks, Adam Jones, Anna Marshall, Darrell Proctor, Mark Randolph and Charles McHenry. James Jennings abstained.

Legislation failed.

TR 20-129 Confirmation of the nomination of Andrew Ewton to serve on the Gaming Operations Authority Board. Sponsored by Patrick Freeman Jr. Adopted 14-1. Voting 'No' was Representative Travis

Andrew Ewton will serve on the Gaming Board Operations upon receiving his gaming license and will expire after three years of the date of the

NCA 20-017 Creation of a new Chapter 9, entitled "Freedom of Information Act" in MCNCA Title 37 "Tribal Government." Sponsored by Mark Randolph. Adopted 15-0.

The MCN believes in the importance of having informed citizenry and finds it vital that MCN citizens be entitled to information pertaining to the affairs of it government. The purpose of the Chapter is to ensure access to public records by Muscogee (Creek) citizens.



Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, funds will be insufficient to fund the FY 2021 Comprehensive Annual Budget of the Nation. It is in the best interest of the Nation to temporarily alter the funds of distribution of gaming revenue to fund the operations of the Tribal Government. After 2021, National Council may revisit the distribution percentages for the future operation of the Nation.

SCHOOL IS IN SESSION AND SOME SCHOOLS HAVE RETURNED TO A CLASSROOM SETTING

CHECOTAH SR RETURNS FOR CLASS

CHECOTAH, Oklahoma -With the fall semester closing in, many schools have started back. Some have taken a virtual approach this year due to the COVID-19 pandemic and some schools have returned to a classroom setting.

According to Checotah high school senior Malachi Harris the traditional setting is not so traditional his year. Like that of most schools, Checotah was let out for spring break in mid-March and did not return for the remainder of the school year due to the outbreak of COVID-19. Checotah Public Schools started the 2020-2021 school year on Aug 13.

"The last time we were at school was March 13," Harris said. "I missed my friends and being able to play football."

Harris claims he is excited about attending school this year and does not feel nervous about going.

"It is different because we do have to wear masks and use social distancing," Harris said. "During lunch some people have to go at different times and have to find different places to sit."

When it comes to having the choice, Harris said he would choose going to school over a virtual learning program. Regardless of a traditional school setting, some things are still undecided like that of homecoming according to Harris.

"I am somewhat worried about having to miss the next half of the year," Harris said. "I would have to miss track and prom."

Harris and his mother Michelle Jones claim that Checotah Public Schools did offer an option for virtual learning but required athletes to attend traditional school to be able to participate in sports activities. That being said, a majority of students returned for the traditional school this year at Checotah.

"I would feel better if he could do virtual," Jones said of her son. "But in order to play sports they were required to go traditional. I made sure he had extra masks and hand sanitizer."

Jones does not want her son to miss out on the memories and activities of being a high school

"Him being involved in sports and it being his senior year, traditional school is something he has to do unless the town closes down again," Jones said. "He worked so hard to get where he's at I'd hate to see it disappear. Like last year, most of the kids did not get to receive their scholarships because they didn't get to play their senior sports."

Jones works in healthcare so she is familiar with the situation at

"At school they have implemented sanitization more by putting hand sanitizer at the end of each hall and having a station right when you walk in the door," Jones said. "You can't miss it."

Jones and Harris say other than starting school a little later than normally scheduled, masks wearing, and sanitization, they hope the school year is as normal as possible.



## FREEDMEN CASE APPEALS TO MCN SC

TWO FREEDMEN CASES WORK THROUGH THE MUSCOGEE (CREEK) NATION COURTS

OKMULGEE, Oklahoma -Two cases seeking to establish rights to citizenship are making their way through the Muscogee (Creek) Nations (MCN) court system. One of those cases is an appeal to the MCN Supreme Court on behalf of Ron Graham, and the other is a petition to the MCN District Court on behalf of Rhonda Grayson and Jeffrey Kennedy.

In 2019 Graham's case was dismissed from the MCN District Court. Now Graham is appealing to MCN SC seeking the same end. The MCN Citizenship Board has submitted a brief in response to the one filed by Graham.

Graham's case is focused on the 1979 Constitution that requires "Creek by blood" prerequisite for citizenship. Graham claims that section of the constitution is unlawful and violates the Creek Treaty of

MCN Citizenship board claims their denial of his enrollment is lawful and that his claims are untimely. At this time the MCN Supreme Court has not given an opinion on the

In the MCN District Court Grayson and Kennedy, both direct lineal descendants of the Dawes Rolls as Creek Freedmen, make the claim that the determinations of their ineligibility for MCN Citizenship is unlawful based on 1866 treaty rights.

While the Grahams citizenship was denied in 2002, Grayson and Kennedy's applications for citizenship were denied in 2019.

Both Kennedy and Grayson have exhausted MCN Citizenship Board remedy and received a final declination of enrollment. Their petition claims, "the 1975 MCN Draft Constitution stripped individuals on

All passed legislation will go before the full Council during the regular session.

LNC addressed the following legislation, the interpretation of which is attributed to language in the bills:

TR 20-142 Authorizing the Principal Chief to execute a cooperative agreement-pass through federal assistance grant application with the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation. Sponsored Darrel Proctor. Motion made do-pass. Passed 4-0.

The MCN Division of Agriculture and Natural Resources requesting to add funding to the Ag Youth Program, a shooting sports component to go along with the archery program for those students enrolled in their county 4-H or local FFA and engaged in the shooting sports programs. This grant will allow a partnership with the state and provide training, PPE, and a clay pigeon thrower.

TR 20-144 Authorizing the Principal Chief to execute a contract with Techsico Native Technologies for the purchase and installation of security cameras. Sponsored by Darrell Proctor. Passed 4-0.

The MCN Department of Housing is requesting to purchase and install security cameras at five rental sites and contract with Techsico Native Technologies for \$203,609.00.

TR 20-146 Authorizing the Principal Chief to execute a purchase and sale agreement and related documents for the sale of property in Jenks, OK. Sponsored by Darrell Proctor. Co-Sponsored by Lucian Tiger III. Executive session was called and went on for 20 minutes before returning to regular session. Passed 4-0.

The MCN purchased the Riverwalk property in Jenks in 2012 and in 2016 the MCN entered an agreement with the Flying Tee to build and lease the facility located on the Riverwalk. Flying Tee sold their business operations to Golf-Suites Tulsa, LLC. GolfSuites Tulsa, LLC has offered to purchase the property, 600 Riverwalk Terrace, Jenks, from the MCN for \$6,550,000.00.

TR 20-148 Authorizing the Principal Chief to execute a ground penetrating radar application with the City of Tulsa. Sponsored by Darrell Proctor. Passed 4-0.

A Muscogee (Creek) family has requested a Ground Penetrating Radar survey at Oaklawn Cemetery in Tulsa, OK in order to locate unmarked gravesites. The Oakland Cemetery is owned by the City of Tulsa thus the Nation's Cultural Preservation Department must obtain written permission from the City of Tulsa to perform a GPR at survey at the location.

NCA 20-061 Reaffirming support for the protection of Muscogee (Creek) sacred site of Hickory Ground near Wetumpka, Alabama and authorizing a special appropriation for the cost of the necessary measures. Sponsored by Darrell Proctor. Motion made do-pass. Passed 4-0. Forwarded to the MCN Business, Finance and Justice Committee Meeting.

Every other year the Council choses to vote on an appropriation for the continued support of the ceremonial grounds Hickory Ground near Wetumpka, Alabama.

As a senior citizen, this program is very important in my circumstances. My employment is part-time where the company I work for I may only record 8 hours a week, this making it difficult to be able to pay my bills.

I submitted my application May 2020. After checking my utility company after a month there was no payment. I made several attempts to the energy dept. to follow up on my application but no response. Finally July 2020, I returned a call from Mrs. West who stated applications sent in May were lost through a computer problem.

Through our conversation I submitted all info upon her request. She stated she would put the info through for payment as of August 2020. There still has not been a payment made or a letter returned regarding my status.

I understand I should not rely on this program for payment of my account but due to COVID-19 it has become difficult plus I am unable to stretch out this payment until the next application is due.

Just like Mr. Maxey this has happened frequently. Last year when it happened the energy program made two payments because it was time for the second application. If there is a problem with the system there should be a review of what's wrong and work on repairing the problem.

Again as Mr. Maxey has stated when there is a problem and its not being solved send it up the ladder for further investigation.


Human Services has had several staff members test positive for Coronavirus during the last few months, and as a result, the infected staff have been on administrative leave. This has undoubtedly impacted

# MCN EUFAULA DORMITORY TAKES MEASURES FOR COVID DURING THE UPCOMING YEAR

DORM WILL NOT HOUSE STUDENTS FOR THE FIRST NINE WEEKS OR ACCEPT NEW ENROLLEES FOR THE SCHOOL YEAR

EUFAULA, Oklahoma -The Muscogee (Creek) Nation Dormitory has made a decision regarding the recent COVID pandemic to follow CDC guidelines and not open the dorm housing to students for the first nine weeks or accept new enrollees for the school

Eufaula Dormitory Administrator, Tony York says they had originally planned to move the students back in the dorms before the scheduled start date of Aug 13; but that was not the

A meeting had taken place between York, Secretary of Education Dr. Monte Randall, and Secretary of Health Shawn Terry and his team to decide what was best and safe for students.

"A decision was made that it what not in our students best interest to open at this time," York said. "We have made a deal with Eufaula Public Schools, and our kids that are previously enrolled at the dormitory are still going to be enrolled at Eufaula Schools and receive virtual learning for the first semester."

The school has provided each student with a Microsoft Chromebook to aid in their virtual learning.

"Here at the Eufaula Dorm, we are going to try to fill in the gaps by providing hotspots so they will have Internet access. We are also going to deliver meals weekly to all of our students. Our athletes will still be able to participate as well and we will be providing transportation to take them to practice and back home."

York claims that some stu-

dents live as far away as Oklahoma City yet those students are not athletes and do not participate in sports.

"We only have six students who participate in sports that require daily transportation," York said. "That's pretty feasible and we do not have to run all of our buses with the small number of students we house."

According to York, Dr. Randall had expressed concerns of the dormitory students being able to participate.

"We have been allowed to keep our staff on board to provide these transportation needs, to be liaisons for technology needs and providing lunches and breakfast for these students," York said.

When it comes to behav-

ioral health and counseling services normally provided, students can still receive those

"Counselors are still available to students or if parents need resources," York said. "We have a wonderful behavioral health team here at the dorm."

"We provide all their needs when they are residents at the dorm," York said. "Even though we won't be as directly involved we will still be available for resource and referral."

The MCN Creek Nation Youth Wellness has also partnered with the Eufaula Dormitory to send out weekly handouts to the students concerning youth wellness.

"We are not able to take stu-

dents directly to these particular appointments but are here for questions and referrals and to help in any way we can," York said.

The Dorm also received a distribution of CARES Act money. They are using these funds to provide all the needs of the operations for the first nine weeks.

"Money has been used to provide each student with a hotspot and internet access, funds have been put towards the transportation services being provided daily by the Dormitory and the meals being provided," York said. "It has been providing the technology for the staff that is teleworking. We are upgrading our HVAC system for when the kids come

back in Jan, installing air purifiers, and providing PPE."

The students have not been to the dorm since mid-March after spring break.

Although students and staff alike were excited for the return of the students to the dorms, York would like to show appreciation for the families for being understanding during this time.

The Muscogee (Creek) Nation Eufaula dormitory is a five-day residential care for Native American students from first grade to seniors in high school. The students who reside within the dorm setting typically come from, different areas of the state yet all students attend Eufaula Public Schools.

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
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# SCOTUS AFFIRMS RESERVATION, UPHOLDS JURISDICTION TO **PROTECT NATIVE WOMEN**

#### Supreme Court of the Land

Legal experts are calling McGirt v. Oklahoma (McGirt) the most significant Federal Indian Law case of the century. On July 9, the Supreme Court's McGirt decision upheld the treaty affirmed reservation borders of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation. The ruling upended previously held legal opinions that jurisdiction over major crimes transferred from federal courts to state courts. Further, that jurisdiction in fact belongs to a federal or tribal court.

"This ruling is critical in the prosecution of domestic violence crimes against Native women," said StrongHearts Native Helpline Director, Lori Jump (Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians). "Jurisdiction or lack of jurisdiction is at the heart of why rates of violence are so high for Native Americans living on trust or reservation lands."

The reservation boundaries of the Muscogee Creek Nation were at stake, but the ruling has a significant impact on who has jurisdiction over major crimes as they relate to both Native and non-Native perpetrators on tribal land.

And, if the Supreme Court had decided to judicially disestablish the Creek Nation's reservation, the majority of those lands within the Nation's historical boundaries would no longer be considered "Indian country."

**Violence Against Women Act** Further, that disestablish-

ment of an existing reservation would not only serve to diminish tribal land but also would eliminate the same tribal jurisdiction that Congress recently, and intentionally, reaffirmed with regard to crimes of domestic violence committed by non-Natives in the 2013 reauthorization of the Violence Against Women Act. Fortunately, this was not the court ruling.

#### **Major Crimes Act**

Previous actions by the federal government, such as the Major Crimes Act of 1855, created a legal framework that resulted in jurisdictional confusion when responding to and prosecuting crimes in Indian country. Through the Major Crimes Act of 1855, the U.S. government assumed concurrent jurisdiction over "serious crimes" committed by a Native American in Indian country. Even basic assistance such as officers responding to 911 calls, was impacted as it could be possible that the law enforcement responding to a call might not be the officer who had jurisdiction over that crime.

In the McGirt case, the State of Oklahoma wrongly assumed jurisdiction when it convicted Jimcy McGirt for violent sex crimes on the reservation of the Creek Nation's reservation. McGirt appealed his case asserting that the State of Oklahoma didn't have authority over a tribal member on tribal land.

#### Deadlock Tie Breaker

There were two criminal cases brought before the SCOTUS, but in one instance there was a conflict of interest. Prior to his role on the SCOTUS, Associate Justice Neil Gorsuch had presided over Sharp v. Murphy in a federal appellate court. The case involved a tribal member who had committed murder on the Creek reservation.

He also contended that a state court didn't have jurisdiction. In Murphy's 2018 appeal to the SCOTUS, Gorsuch ultimately had to recuse himself; and without Gorsuch, the potential for deadlock on the SCOTUS prevented its natural conclusion. Thus, the Murphy case was hinged upon the outcome of McGirt.

In the landmark ruling, Gorsuch wrote the majority opinion, "Today we are asked whether the land these treaties promised remains an Indian reservation for purposes of federal criminal law. Because Congress has not said otherwise, we hold the government to its word."

#### **SCOTUS Upends Previously Held Legal Opinions**

Although many experts agree that the SCOTUS opinion was accurate and reflected the original intent of the treaties in question, non-Native legislators argued that Native people left Indian territory of their own accord and as such forfeited title to the reservation.

Further, that due to the lack of Native inhabitants, the reservation ceased to exist. In reality, Native people were continuously forced out of Indian Territory by white settlers and the U.S. government. Regardless, the crux of it all as pointed out by SCOTUS was that only an act of Congress could disestablish a tribal reservation, see Solem v. Bartlett (1984).

#### **StrongHearts Stands** with Survivors

StrongHearts Native Helpline recognizes the importance of the McGirt decision for victims and survivors of violence. Tribal nations are one step closer to holding all perpetrators accountable for committing crimes against Native people on tribal lands. Strong-Hearts' mission is to restore power to Native Americans impacted by domestic, dating and sexual violence by providing a system of safety, sovereignty and support with a vision to return to our traditional lifeways where our relatives are safe, violence is eradicated and sacredness is restored.

the Creek Freedman Rolls and their descendants of MCN citizenship," and "prevented lineal descendants from becoming citizens of the MCN."

According to court records the draft constitution was later adopted in 1979.

The petition also sites the recent SCOTUS opinion as one of their arguments that the MCN Treaty of 1866 is binding where it pertains to Creek Freedmen.

'There has been no act of Congress expressing any intent to abrogate Article 2 of the Creek Treaty of 1866,' the petition said. 'The MCN cannot unilaterally extinguish the Freedmen's rights under the Creek Treaty of 1866.'

Their petition claims that the MCN's denial of the Creek Freedmen citizenship breached the MCN 1866 treaty, and violates the U.S. constitution.

The petition asks that the Court declare Creek Freedmen are eligible for Creek citizenship, guarantees the right to full and equal citizenship, the Creek Freedmen be legally indistinguishable from other citizens, on the same basis as all citizens including the right to vote, receive funds and benefits available to all citizens, and the right to run for and hold MCN office.

The petition ask that no federal statute or superseding treaty be able to modify the Creek Freedmen Descendants citizenship rights granted in the 1866 treaty.

It further asks, 'actions

depriving Creek Freedmen their full MCN citizenship rights be declared a violation of the Treaty of 1866.'

Additionally, the petition asks the court to award attorney's fees, disbursements and costs to the Muscogee (Creek) Nation.

While these case have been filed in the courts, no dockets are published with hearing dates because the MCN District Court is still operating under a COVID-19 Administrative Order since May 18. Those administrative orders require reduced staff operations. Other than emergency hearings, no hearings will be set except upon grant of the judge.

Mvskoke Media will continue to the follow the cases and provide updates as they become available.



# ROYALTY PROGRAM LOOKING TO TRANSFORM INTO A YOUNG AMBASSADOR PROGRAM

OKMULGEE, Oklahoma-Myskoke Royalty Coordinator Shelby Botone and the Public Relations Department Multimedia Specialist Liz Gray hosted an open discussion forum over a new program for Myskoke Ambassadors program.

A virtual open discussion was held on Friday, Aug. 14 about changes in the pageant and competition program and new Mvskoke Ambassadors program. Botone and Gray were joined by former princesses and other citizens.

Before the discussion the topic was placed on the Health, Education and Welfare Committee session.


In a HEW committee session NCA 20-055 stated, 'A law of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation creating new law in MCNCA Title 16, Chapter 8, Subchapter 2 entitled "Young Mvskoke Ambassador Program and Competition" and repealing MCNCA Title 37, subchapter 2-119 entitled, "Mvskoke (Creek) Nation Pageant and Royalty."

In this committee session Botone and Gray both made the comment to postpone indefinitely for more open discussion.

During the open discussion, Botone went into explanation of what some of the changes were for the program. One of the changes for the program is to open an ambassador role to a young man.

"We just wanted an opportunity to promote our young men and for them to be role models for the community as well," Botone said. "This was our main purpose of the

canceled this year, they took the opportunity of making changes and rejuvenate the program. Botone wants to gear towards a leadership competition rather than using the term "pageant." They also want to stick to the term ambassador instead of "royalty" and "princess."

"The legislation doesn't state it but we are going to keep Miss Muscogee (Creek) Nation," Botone said. "That position will stay relatively the same. There is no changes we wanted to do but add requirements during the reign."

The scholarship will still be awarded to the ambassadors selected. They will select however many ambassadors to represent with what the budget allows.

"We were just going to focus on the two ambassadors this year, which we've had just two in the past years," Botone said. "But its something we can discuss."

Botone wants to have more ambassadors in the future, because there was discussion about At-large ambassadors. There is also plans to have an At-large representative to help out with those future ambassadors.

Gray said, "Especially with At-large, instead of adding so many positions we can expand the requirements for each position. I know the elimination of Jr. Miss was disussed, we were thinking of expanding the age range for Miss from 16 to 24. It is a scholsrship program so if they are concurrent enrolled into college, trade or vocational school they can do that."

With the legislation there was discussions made about repealing the program, but it was originally amended. Botone said they were advised so much terms would have to be changed, and that is why they began with repealing.

"We're all for growing the program in future years that's why we kept the legislation open just for flexibility purposes," Botone said.

The ambassadors roles would be the same as what the royalty does now; travel to promote the nation in government or cultursl level, summer internship (possibly), spend some time in Washington D.C. shadowing ambassador Jonodev Chaudhuri.

"Those were some of the discussions but we do want to focus on them learning how our government works as far as writing legislation shadowing council and varius departments in our Nation," Botone stated.

"We want them to promote their platform," Gray added.

In this discussion one participant stated this is what the youth council does. Gray talked about giving youth as many opportunities as possible. She believes the youth council could be a stepping stone for the ambassador pro-

"I would love to have a partnership with the youth council," Gray stated.

A male member of the youth council was actually on the discussion forum and stated, he was appreciative of them extending the ambassador program to males but did not support it. He believes having a male ambassador would take away the Mvskoke women.

"I feel like the discussion went really well," Botone said. "I'm glad we're having this. discussion just because it's bringing up a lot of input from other citizens."

This was the first discussion meeting out of more for the new ambassador program, Botone wants it to be ongoing for some time.

# "I'm Bored" & Adolescents





chemical cocktail we all use to learn). This is why it is very important to prepare our adolescents to be mindful of boredom, learn from their mistakes, learn how to not let their feelings control them, know the risks of addiction, and learn to set future goals and the steps to achieve those goals.

In the last article we talked about adolescents will become addicted 1 ½ faster than children and adults due to a higher level of LTP (Long Term Potentiation – the

Most adolescents do not realize how their brains are wired and how they are primed for addiction. Often all they are told is "don't do drugs", "stay away from drugs", "they are bad for you", "it is a gateway to a life of addiction", "just say no", "drugs will destroy your future", "this is your brain on drugs...", etc. We all have heard these slogans but these slogans and adolescents often don't mesh well. Adolescents are developmentally wired to question, doubt, wonder,

explore, and try new things out. This is part of learning to be an adult. So, telling an adolescent what to or not to do is not that effective. We must change our approach and turn our statements into information and questions.

- Give information about how they are wired to learn. These articles can be used to help them understand what is going on in their brain. How their brain is being wired to build new neuropathways/roads they will be using the rest of their life.
- Ask questions with information.
- o Have you ever wondered why there is such a strong push towards the adolescent market? They know if they get a teen to try or use their product, they have a very high likelihood of a user for life.
  - Nicotine 80-90% of adult users (smokers, vapers, dippers, chewers) started as a teen • Alcohol – 47-72% of adults with alcohol related problems/addictions started as a teen
  - Gambling 6-23% of adults with gambling addiction started as a teen
  - Illegal drugs 24-72% started as a teen (excluding Marijuana)
  - Pornography 12-68% of adults whose addiction affects their marriages, relationships, work, finances started as a teen

MONEY is the driving force why adolescents are a big focus. The potential lifetime amount of money the addict will pay is insurmountable. Someone is getting rich off of another's addiction.

- Ask questions about future goals, dreams, aspirations. This can be small to larger goals. Adolescents are in that transition between child and adult. Part of this process is learning how to see a bigger picture. Adolescents often struggle seeing only one answer, one way, one solution. Teaching the adolescent to see a bigger picture is really hard but the best way is to do this is through future questions.
  - o What is your goal this year in school?
  - o What is your goal when you get bored to avoid a potential lifelong mistake? o What is your goal/dream in 5 years? What would you like to be doing? Where would you like to be?

o What kind of person do you want to be when you are older? Reputation?

o What is your goal/desire to build your tribal legacy?
o What is your goal when you are offered/tempted to try a highly addictive product?

o What success story do you want to be able to tell someone in the future?

Questions usually get the frontal lobe (the logical thinking part of the brain) to work and that is a huge goal of raising a thinking adult. These questions will help the adolescent see beyond the now and see where they want to be. To help them solidify this process you will need to ask part two of the question. What will you do (in specific situations, daily, weekly, monthly, yearly, etc.) to achieve this goal?

The answer you are given opens up a huge learning opportunity.

If they say "I don't know", then they are primed to learn. You may need to ask "would you like my help?"
If they say "I'll just do it" but cannot tell you how, they are in essence telling you I know what I want but I don't know how to get there. A follow up questions


to this response could be "what small steps are you going to do to help you achieve your goal?" • If they respond with a good answer you may still want to follow up with the more specific question "what small steps are you going to do to help you achieve your goal?"

Our adolescents are our future and we need to do our best to protect, prepare, and educate them for success. The next part of this article will be about those who are already using and what you can do to help.

The Hill reports, the Cheyenne River Sioux denied access to motorcycle riders and tourists wanting to cross the reservation on Interstate 90, ' to attend the annual biker rally in Sturgis, South Dakota. The tribes their checkpoints were set up to prevent the spread of coronavirus.

The Hill also reports that the action by this tribe and the Oglala Sioux tribe was a reaction to a conflict with the state governor 'regarding the legality of the traffic checkpoints.'

But those officials said the name would be to honor all tribes who served in such a capacity. There were other tribes who used their own languages in the same way.

Not to be a stick-in-the-mud, but wouldn't that bring us back to where we started, using Native people as mascots? Probably not much chance of it happening

Speaking of Code Talkers, Indian Country Today reports, a newly marketed beer can have folks down in Dine lands getting upset and some who are supportive of the new beer can featuring the face of a Code Talker wearing his military-tribal regalia. "Code Talker Pale Ale" is brewed by the descendant of one of the Code Talkers.

He says, "This can release and design was done out of a good place in my heart, without any malice." Opponents of the beverage and image say alcohol has damaged many Native lives and they should not be used to promote the brew.

Former Principal Chief George Tiger has been sentenced to a year and a day in federal prison after pleading guilty to charges of embezzlement. He got a reduced sentence after health concerns were presented.

The feature film about the murders of Osage oil rights holders will begin filming next year. The Tulsa World reported that "Killers of the Flower Moon." The production schedule was delayed by concerns over the Covid-19 virus.

All passed legislation will go before the full Council during the regular session Aug. 29.

HEW addressed the following legislation, the interpretation of which is attributed to language in

TR 20-137 Execute a grant of limited waiver of sovereign immunity in favor of the Wal-Mart local community grant, for the sole purpose of complying with Wal-Mart requirements to support the execution of a grant agreement between Wal-Mart and the Muscogee (Creek) Nation. Sponsored by Representative Mary Crawford.

The Wal-Mart Local Community grant supports the Nation's tribal programs with a limited waiver of sovereign immunity. Postponed Indefinitely. 4-0.

TR 20-138 To submit a grant application to the U.S. Department of the Interior, Bureau of Indian Affairs, Fiscal Year 2020 Living Languages Grant Program for the Mvskoke Language Program. Sponsored by Mary Crawford.

The Myskoke Language Program seeks funding to further document and expand access the Myskoke Language by making resources available and to hire a language instructor. Do Pass. Passed 4-0.

TR 20-139 To execute an order form, Master Services Agreement and Service schedule for signature with Docusign, Inc. to provide on-line enrollment, financial aid, course work and staff documents for the College of the Muscogee Nation. Sponsored by Representative James Jennings.

The College of the Muscogee

Nation transitioned to online and has identified Docusign, Inc. as the vendor to assist with online enrollment, financial aid, course work and staff documents during the COVID-19 Pandemic. Do Pass.

TR 20-140 To execute a certain lease agreement between the Muscogee (Creek) Nation Department of Health and Stryker Sales Corporation. Sponsored by Representative Joyce Deere.

Muscogee (Creek) Nation Department of Health purchases their endoscopy equipment from Stryker Sales Corporation, and now MCNDOH want to execute the agreement. Do Pass. Passed 4-0.

NCA 20-053 Authorizing the expenditure of grant funds awarded from the Institute of Museum and Library Services for the benefit of the College of the Muscogee Nation. Sponsored by James Jennings.

NCA 20-055 Creating a new law in MCNCA Title 16, Chapter 8, Subchapter 2 entitled, "Young Mvskoke Ambassador Program and Competition" and repealing MCNCA Title 37, sub 2-119 entitled, "Mvskoke (Creek) Nation Pageant and Royalty." Sponsored by Representative Anna Marshall.

The Public Relations Department evaluated areas of improvement for the Pageant and Royalty. This new ambassador program through a competitive process will allow all young Mvskoke citizens to gain understanding of leadership values.


