CONGRESS FUNDS TRIBES TO SUPPORT MCGIRT DECISION

THE GOVERNMENT-SPENDING BILL INCLUDED FUNDS TO ASSIST TRIBES DUE TO MCGIRT

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oklahoma - Tribal nations were allocated \$62 million in the U.S. Congress spending bill that was announced on Wednesday March 9. The bill will help improve the criminal justice systems and assist in the overload of cases caused by the landmark McGirt Decision.

Originally, four Oklahoma delegates requested \$308 million in federal funding from the House Appropriations Committee in letters dating January 19.

"The result of the Supreme Court case has created a severe shortage of police and investigative personnel in tribal jurisdiction areas, which in turn has drastically increased federal and tribal law enforcement responsibilities," the Oklahomans wrote.

Reps. Stephanie Bice, R-Oklahoma City; Tom Cole, R-Moore; Frank Lucas, R-Cheyenne; and Markwayne Mullin, R-Westville, signed the letters. Rep. Kevin Hern, R-Tulsa wrote a separate letter on Dec. 2 requesting more funding with no specified amount of funding.

The Bureau of Indian Affairs was to consult with tribes and submit a request for allocating the money as directed Congress.

Although the funding has fallen short of the original request by Oklahoma's Congressional delegates, tribes are appreciative of Congress for aid and overall support of the McGirt decision.


The Appropriations Committee said the agreement reached on funding for the Justice Department appropriately funds the U.S. Attor-

ney's offices, United States Marshals Service, DEA, and FBI workload increases resulting from the McGirt v. Oklahoma decision for fiscal year 2022.

Principal Chief David Hill released a statement saying the Muscogee (Creek) Nation is encouraged by the actions of Congress on that Wed. for the reauthorization of Violence Against Women Act and support of tribes implementing the U.S. Supreme Court's "sovereignty-affirming McGirt ruling".

VAWA will provide important tools to help tribal nations throughout the U.S. pursue justice and provide support to Indian women who are victims of violent crimes or domestic abuse committed by non-Indians.

"We continue to make significant investments to expand our

OCMULGEE MOUNDS GROWS WITH ADDITIONAL PROTECTION OF LAND

ANCESTRAL LAND RECEIVES PROTECTION WITH THE HELP OF LAND AND WATER CONSERVATION FUND AND PRIVATE FUNDING

MACON, Georgia- The Ocmulgee Mounds National Historic Park is receiving an additional 951-acres that will protect some of the most significant prehistoric Indigenous mounds in North America.

The national historic park was established in 1936, it preserves and interprets evidence of one of the longest periods of human habitation at any one in the national park system. Ocmulgee Mounds has yielded artifacts from every major period of American Indian history in the Southeast.

According to an Ocmulgee Mounds press release, the 951-acre property is located adjacent to the park and inside the city limits of Macon. The property was under threat of incompatible industrial development before Open Space Institute (OSI) negotiated a deal to purchase the land in 2021. The project will be a major result of an expansion of the park in 2019.

The acquisition is made up of 906 acres and will be transferred to the National Park Service (NPS) immediately, according to the press release. The other 45 acres will be transferred to the Ocmulgee Land Trust during wetlands restoration and then later donated to the park service.

The property is located within the "Ocmulgee Old Fields," also known as the Macon Reserve. The Ocmulgee Old Fields Macon Reserve is a site revered as a sacred place to the Muskogean people. It is compromised of lands specifically retained by the Muscogee (Creek) Nation from 1805 until the 1826 Treaty of Washington.

MCN Principal Chief David Hill said in a release, "This additional property includes some of

our most important unprotected ancestral lands. The Muscogee (Creek) Nation has a long-standing history of preserving the Ocmulgee Old Fields-Macon Reserve. We have never forgotten where we came from and the lands around the Ocmulgee River will always and forever be our ancestral homeland, a place we consider sacred and a place with rich cultural history."

The park's striking mounds are marvels of highly skilled Indigenous engineering that today constitute one of America's most important cultural landscapes. Seven of the mounds can be found at the park, including the 55-foothigh Great Temple Mound, located on a high bluff overlooking the floodplain of the Ocmulgee River. Cornfield Mound is believed to have originally been a ceremonial cornfield, where the mound was built over the field. Earth Lodge is a reconstructed council chamber of the Mississippian culture with the original 1,000-year-old clay floor. The Funeral Mound is a burial spot for elite members of the Mississippian society, originally standing at 50 ft. tall. The McDougal Mounds was built by the Mississippians after Captain Robert McDougal who was in command of Fort Hawkins in 1809 died. Mound X is no longer visible but was found in 1806 and only stood at three feet high at the time. The Southeast Mound is unknown but the oval shape of it is believed to be caused by an erosion and ploughing before the 1930's.

The Muskogean people who built these mounds spoke unique dialects reflecting lingual divergence from other tribes more than 3,000 years ago, making it the only truly native southeastern language.

"It is our solemn duty and honor to protect our nation's most significant lands. It's even more critical that we work collaboratively with Tribal nations to ensure proper conservation and access. The National Park Service will continue to work with willing sellers to preserve the culturally significant land associated with the Ocmulgee Old Fields," said National Park Service Director Chuck Sams in a press release.

The conservation project was funded by the NPS using Land and Water Conservation Funds, Kno-

MCN CULTURAL PRESERVATION **BRING LIBRARIES TO COMMUNITIES**

PROJECT FUNDED BY THE INSTITUTE OF MUSEUM AND LIBRARY SERVICES

OKMULGEE, Oklahoma -Muscogee (Creek) Community Centers around the Mvskoke Reservation are participating in a project to educate the members and citizens offered by the Muscogee (Creek) Nation Cultural Preservation Department.

Cultural Coordinator and Librarian Odette Freeman refers to the project as the Mini Library

The project is funded by a \$50,000 grant awarded to the department by the Institute of Museum and Library Services.

Freeman claimed the department is a frequent grantee of IMLS, and this grant was one they apply for yearly usually amounts to \$7,000, but due to COVID the grant amount had increased.

Normally, Freeman uses the grant funds to supply art classes at the various community cen-

"Due to COVID, we weren't

able to do that," Freeman said.

"We had to think of another fo-

cus for our grant." The department landed on the idea of mini libraries and provided community centers with shelving and 50 books each and other small supplies including time stamps and due date

The shelves were set up inside the centers, where they are accessible to all.

Freeman stated there will be books for all ages and groups.

"We want this information to be shared because it's not taught at the schools," she said.

According to Freeman, many of the communities within the reservation do not have access to a public library.

The department's goal is to provide citizens with readily available information to spread education on Mvskoke history and culture.

"We want to get people to want to learn more," Freeman

CHANGES TO COME, REZ DOGS AWARDS, COMIC PRINCESS, WILD ONION DINNERS

Okmulgee, Oklahoma-In late February, the Interior Department put out a preliminary report on its plan to change the names of geographic places on its federally controlled lands that use a Native American slur. 660 places use such terms in their names.

The worst examples were places that used the word: "Sq..w" in its title (That one's so bad, I can't even write it.) First on the list, a spot in Alabama named: "Sq..w Shoals." It's possible replacement: "Bankhead Lake." According to Native News Online, each candidate for the change gets 5 possible replacements.

If you have a suggestion, check out the Federal Register, "Reconciliation of Derogatory Geographic Names. But you have to hurry, the deadline is April 25, 2022. My favorite is one called, "Snag Point."

Native News Online had another noteworthy article. After

nearly 150 years, two Lakota young men will finally be returned to their lands and peoples after being sent to the Carlisle Indian Industrial School in Pennsylvania in 1869-if the U.S. Army approves.

Amos LaFramboise and Edward Wright passed away while attending the school as part of the U.S. government's ill-famed attempts to eliminate the Indian culture from Native children. Both young men died while attending Carlisle and were buried there. Their families have been working with the Army and have nearly completed the necessary paperwork.

Once this sad task is finished, the job is not over. There are 176 other Native children still buried there.


On a much lighter note, the Hollywood Reporter says, the folks from the wildly popular TV series, "Reservation Dogs" have collected a few more awards, this time from the 37th Film Independent Spirit Awards. At least five cast members received awards and the series itself got recognition for wins for best new scripted series and best ensemble cast in a new scripted series.

More lighter notes, a comic book stereotypical "Indian Maiden" image is being dumped by Marvel Comics. A nubile, barely-clad "Indian princess" character will be disappearing from the pages of the "King Conan" comic book. In its ridiculous story line, the comic uses the name "Matoaka", which just happens to be the name of the Powhatan woman known as Pocahontas.

The comic's creator admitted his ignorance about the woman, apologized, and is donating the proceeds from the publication to the National Indian Women's Resource Center.

Have you made it out to one of the church-sponsored Tafvmpuce (Wild Onion) dinners yet? So far, this year, I tried to pick up a couple of dinners from the Pickett Chapel UMC feast but with no luck. After standing in line for about an hour, they ran out of everything and left a bunch of us disappointed. Bummer. Oklahoma have created the need to expand tribal capacity and are grateful for the addition of vital funding to support these efforts as an extension of the federal government's trust authority and responsibilities to tribal nations.

"We are thankful to Oklahoma's delegation for their leadership on these important issues that deliver benefits to tribal citizens and everyone who lives in Oklahoma." - Principal Chief David Hill

The House Appropriations Committee approved a bill last year that included \$70 million to boost funding for the state's three U.S. attorney offices, the FBI, the Drug Enforcement Agency and the U.S. Marshal's Service.

However, the spending bill for the Interior Department, which included the Bureau of Indian Affairs, added only \$10 million for tribes to ramp up their criminal justice systems.

OKMULGEE, Oklahoma-Muscogee (Creek) siblings Ayo and Anniyah Bear made an appearance at the Oklahoma Kids Wrestling Association (OKWA) State Championships bringing home two medals, one for each and qualifying for world championships.

Back on February 18 & 19 the Bear siblings wrestled their way to the wrestling state tournament in Oklahoma City, making this Ayo's third appearance and Anniyah's second appearance. They were two out of 21 from their academy to make it to state.

Ayo, who is in the third grade at Wilson Public Schools made his first appearance at the OKWA State Championships in 2020 where he placed first in the Division I category. Returning for the third time,

the young wrestler was named runner-up in the Division II

Anniyah, who is in the first grade at Wilson Schools made her first appearance at the state championships in 2021 where she was named runner-up. She returned for her second year and received first place in the Division I category 7 and un-

Both siblings wrestle with MOJO Grappling Academy out of Schulter, Oklahoma. Their coaches are Jeremy Tecumseh, Garrett Sands and Robby Bear. Their practices take place at Wilson Indian Community Gym. The siblings work hard during practice to be better competitors on the mats.

Traysa Bear who is the mother of both wrestlers reported they had 61 wins, 14 losses and 47 pins combined

Anniyah has been wrestling

for two years with the club. She wrestles in the 7 and under girl's division 45 pounds, and also the Division I boy's 43 lbs. Ayo has been wrestling for seven years. He is in the Division II competing against 83 through 120 lbs weight class.

With the state championships behind on them, the siblings look forward to competing in the world's championships that takes place in Reno, Nevada. Since both have won in state they qualified for world's, making MOJO Grappling Academy take seven qualifiers.

"It was really intense," Traysa said about watching her children compete in state. "There was no feeling to prepare you or anything for it."

MOJO Grappling Academy will be taking their seven qualifiers to the Reno World Championships April 7-10 to represent Oklahoma.

The story highlights the 1956 classic film, "The Ten Commandments."


Actor and former Superman/ Clark Kent, Dean Cain plays the villain role in Harmon's film, the boss of the father who tries to stray him away from church on Sunday.

"REZ DOGS" FILMING LOCATION HOLDS RICH CULTURE

MEADOW LAKE RANCH BECOMES HOTSPOT IN OK FOR FILMING

SANDS SPRINGS, Oklahoma - On the surface, Meadow Lake Ranch is a tucked away location with a beautiful scenery and hospitality to match. When patrons pass through the "Meadowlake Ranch" welded gate, two gravel roads give options to travelers, to the right will take them to the beautiful sites and amenities that has gained a reputation in the area. By taking the left leading into the woods, visitors take a journey of the land and history of the ranch.

Owned by Chickasaw citizen Suzy Warren and her husband Tom, the 260-acre property is part of what once was a Muscogee (Creek) allotment.

According to Tom, this property belonged to a Muscogee (Creek) named Taylor Postoak.

That was his "white name" as his son Lincoln Postoak called it in a 1937 interview with Tulsa World journalist by the name of Effie S. Jackson.

His name was Nokose Yahola, and in Cherokee it was Choskoyoha, according to the article.

Postoak was a Civil War Veteran and settled in this area near the Euchee River, just a mile away from Sand Springs, where he built a home for his

The home is gone now but close to where the house is believed to be located is a 40foot deep well that Postoak dug himself for water for the home, Tom explained.

In Tom's personal research, he spoke with Postoak family members to learn about the original inhabitant of the land and what he did while he lived on the resourceful land.

"You know he had a big heart," he said of Postoak.

The Postoak family history presence is strong on the land. The Warren's property even contains a small family cemetery, "Postoak Cemetery."

The first person to be buried in the cemetery was Postoak's 15-year-old daughter, Phoebe.

Warren told the story of Postoak and how during a time of racism and discrimination, he offered a white man a spot to bury his young daughter who died while traveling; she is the second person buried in the cemetery.

"He told him, 'you can bury her beside my daughter," Tom

Tom has found similarities between himself and the original landowner. As Postoak himself built his home by hand, he also built all the structures across the ranch himself as well. Tom spoke of Postoak almost as if he knew him personally, but the catch is Tom himself has no Native American descent.

He and his family respect the Native American culture, even refusing to enter the cem-

"I just don't feel right going in there because I'm not Creek," he said.

The cemetery holds 143 marked graves along with several unmarked.

Warren has allowed other members of the tribe to visit and allows volunteers from a Muscogee (Creek) church to care for it.

The Warren's bought the property almost a quarter century ago, for what was intended to be for family activity purposes with their two young children at the time. Now they live on and host the property as a bed and breakfast and event venue and share the experience with their eight grandchildren.

Located in the most northeastern part of the Muscogee Reservation, the property has it all; spring fed bodies of water, creeks, grasslands, woods, hills, lodging and entertainment along with added hiking trails and cultural activities. That's what attracted the Warrens here.

"I wanted the meadow; he wanted the lake," Suzy said.

And that's where the name came from. The large body of natural water that cuts out a large hill that gives a very mountainous feels for being in the plains, but once you turn around from looking down you see land for miles.

The scenery even attracted the FX Series "Reservation Dogs" co-created by Muscogee/ Seminole Sterlin Harjo.

Tom is a huge fan of the show, "Sterlin Harjo is a genius," he said.

Tom believes that the scenes filmed in the woods of his property are in episodes five, six, and seven.


After touring the scenery on the back of the property in wooded area and taking a new road that was built specifically for the Reservation Dogs staff, it is clear that the Warrens were very accommodating to the production crews that come

Meadowlake Ranch was a primary location for the Oscar-winning "Minari" and other independent films like "The Rock-n-Roll Dreams of Christopher Duncan" along with several national commercials, documentary and made for TV commercials, according to

The ranch's first claim to fame may have been in 2008 when Paul McCartney spent his 66th birthday at the bed and breakfast.

Meadowlake Ranch has grown beyond the Warren's intention becoming a new hotspot for film makers, while hosting special ceremonies like weddings, celebrations of life, the Dude Ranch, hiking trails, cabins, barns, lodge, gun range, calf practice roping, tomahawk and axe throwing, swimming, and really any outdoor activity to be thought can be accommodated by Tom himself.

All passed legislation is subject to the full Council approval during the Regular Session.

LNC addressed the following legislation, the interpretation of which is attributed to language in the bills:

TR 22-044

Authorizing the Principal Chief to execute two separate agreements for

gas installation by Oklahoma Natural Gas Company for the MCN GSA Warehouse and the Safe Space Facility located in Okmulgee OK. Representative Galen Cloud sponsored the legislation, which passed 4-0.

There is a current need for natural gas utility line to provide services to GSA and the Safe Space Facility.

TR 22-045

Authorizing the Principal Chief to execute a memorandum of agreement between the MCN and the Schulter School District for the Schulter School Parking Lot Project. Rep. Nelson Harjo Sr. sponsored the legislation, which passed 4-0.

The agreement is regarding the

construction of an asphalt parking lot with drainage improvements on the Schulter school complex.

TR 22-048

Authorizing the Principal Chief to execute an agreement with the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development, acting by and through the Southern Plains Office of Native American Programs. Rep. Nelson Harjo Sr. sponsored the legislation, which passed 4-0.

The Nation has been in delinquency of submitting the required audit due to COVID-19 impacts that are preventing the initiation of audit field work and preparation and submission of the draft audit to the auditee and the final audit FAC.

SPONAP acknowledges that the Nation has taken action to comply with the audit submission requirements, but the pandemic has prevented MCN from complying with the audit submission requirement.

HEW addressed the following legislation, the interpretation of which is attributed to language in

TR 22-043

Authorizing the execution of a grant award letter with the National Congress of American Indians Fund awarding grant funds in the amount of \$5,000 to the Muscogee (Creek) Nation Scholarship Foundation. Representative Leonard Gouge sponsored the resolution, which passed 4-0.

The MCN Scholarship Foundation was awarded \$5,000 in COVID Response Fund.

The grant award letter waives MCN's sovereign immunity by requiring the Nation to indemnify the NCAI fund, its officers, employees, agents and affiliates from

and against any and all third-party claims, liabilities, costs and expenses arising out of, or resulting from any harmful or neglectful activities that are partially or wholly supported by the Nation's use of grant funds.

TR 22-049

Authorizing the Principal Chief to execute a letter of agreement with Kotter International Inc. for the benefit of College of the Muscogee Nation. Rep. Anna Marshal sponsored the resolution, which passed 4-0.

Kotter International Inc. is a professional development training series for CMN Administrators, Faculty and Staff. Carter will provide an 8-week virtual training for CMN.

NCA 22-019

Amending MCNCA Title 37, subsection 2-123, entitled "Este Cate Veterans (Mvskoke Nation) Honor Guard." Rep. Gouge sponsored the resolution, which passed 4-0 and forwarded to the Business, Finance and Justice committee for funding source.

An annual appropriation of \$20,000 to \$40,000 towards Myskoke Nation Honor Guard includes meals following local activities and to include per diem while traveling in and out of state.

NCA 22-020

Authorizing the expenditure of grant funds in the amount of \$5,000 received from the National Congress of American Indians for the Muscogee (Creek) Nation Scholarship Foundation. Rep. Gouge sponsored the resolution, which passed

The MCN Scholarship Foundation received grant funds from the National Congress of American Indians in the amount of \$5,000. The funds will help to provide supplemental scholarships to students who have been impacted by COVID-19.

NCA 22-022

Authorizing the expenditure of grant funds awarded in the amount of \$2,707,132 from the Department of Health and Human Services Administration for children and families for the benefit of the Family Violence Prevention Program. Rep. Marshall sponsored the resolution, which passed 4-0.

The grant funds in the amount of \$2,707,132 awarded will be used increase services for sexual assault survivors during the COVID-19

public health crisis, capacity and work support for advocates and SANE nurses, while also increasing access to multi-disciplinary training for professionals interacting with survivors.

NCA 22-023

Authorizing the expenditure of grant funds awarded in the amount of \$9,741,589 from the Department of Health and Human Services Administration for children and families for the benefit of the Family Violence Prevention Program. Rep. Marshall sponsored the resolution, which passed 4-0.

The grant funds of \$9,741,589 will be used to conducts programs and activities in response to the COVID-19 public health emergency to ensure that domestic violence survivors and their dependents have access to mobile health units.

NCA 22-024

A law of Muscogee (Creek) Nation amending MCNCA Title 11 subsection 3-201, entitled "CMD Fund" and subscription 6-303, entitled "Audits." Rep. Marshall sponsored the resolution, which passed 4-0.

The amendment would add the following to section B of MCNCA Title 11 subsection 3-201: "Exception, in the event that Muscogee (Creek) Nation hosts an event outside of the reservation, CMD Funds may be used for overnight stays in accordance with the Nation's Travel Policy."

NCR 22-003

Selecting Jackie Jackson to the Board of Directors of Muscogee Nation Gaming Enterprises, LLC. Representative Patrick Freeman Jr. sponsored the resolution, which passed 3-0.

The National Council has selected Muscogee (Creek) citizen Jackie Jackson to serve on the Board of Directors for a term that shall end March 31, 2023.

NCR 22-004

Selecting Cynthia M. Tiger to the Board of Directors of Muscogee Nation Gaming Enterprises, LLC. Rep. Anna Marshall sponsored the resolution, which passed 3-0.

The National Council has selected Muscogee (Creek) citizen Cynthia M. Tiger to serve on the Board of Directors for a term that shall end March 31, 2024.

TR 22-046

Confirming the nomination of Geraldine (Geri) Wisner to serve as the Attorney General of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation. Rep. Thomasene Yahola Osborn sponsored the resolution, which passed 3-1 with Rep. Patrick Freeman Jr. voting no.

The Principal Chief has nominated Muscogee (Creek) citizen Geraldine "Geri" Wisner to serve as the MCN Attorney General.

TR 22-047

Confirming the nomination of Jeffrey Fife to serve as the Chief of Staff of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation. Rep. Darrell Proctor sponsored the resolution, which passed 3-1 with Rep. Sandra Golden voting

The Principal Chief as nominated MCN citizen Jeffrey Fife to serve as the Chief of Staff of the MCN.

TR 22-050

Authorizing the Principal Chief to execute a contract with Karpel Solutions for the benefit of the Office of the Attorney General. Rep.

Mark Randolph sponsored the resolution, which passed 3-1 with Golden voting no.

The Office of Attorney General has identified Karpel Solutions as the best software system for updating its criminal case management system and converting its case records to a digitized system.

NCA 22-015

A law of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation amending MCNCA Title 37 substitute 3-505, entitled "Employee at will doctrine not impliedly abolished." Rep. Leonard Gouge sponsored the legislation, which failed 2-3. Patrick Freeman Jr. and Randall Hicks, along with Thomasene Yahola Osborn who broke the tie voted against the legislation.

The legislation would have abolished the doctrine of at will employment for the Nation's tribal government. Subject to limitations as outlined in this Chapter and subchapter (such as violations of the law and drug or alcohol related matters), disciplinary matters involving employees of the Nation shall be subject to a progressive disciplinary model.

NCA 22-019

NCA 22-021

Authorizing an appropriation of funds for the installation of Natural Gas utility service for the MCN GSA Warehouse and Safe Space Facility. Rep. Galen Cloud sponsored the legislation, which passed 4-0.

The Nation is to pay \$200,655 for the installation of the natural gas utility line.

NCR 22-006

Preparing support and solidarity with the people and Nation of Ukraine. Rep. Marshall sponsored the legislation, which passed 3-1 with Golden voting no.

MCN as a sovereign Nation stands in solidarity with Ukraine. No other tribal nation has reached out to the people of Ukraine and MCN would be the first tribal na-

Rep. Marshall stated, "On February 24, CNN news viewers saw women and children leaving Ukraine going to other states to seek refuge. As they were walking it reminded me of our women and children of the Trail of Tears, it's not the exact same journey but similar."

MEAT PIE LADY FINDS SPOT WITH **MOTHER ROAD MARKET**

SHANNON JAMES OWNER OF "REZ SERVED" ACCEPTED INTO PROGRAM TO HELP FULFILL DREAM

OKMULGEE, Oklahoma- In the kitchen of her very own home you will find Shannon James owner of "Rez Served" cooking up dishes with a Rez twist as she grows in her own business with the help of Mother Road Market - Kitchen 66 launch program.

James is a Cherokee Nation citizen who recently moved to Okmulgee with her family. Before getting into the launch program, she had a career in the medical field working with Indian Health Services as an Oral Surgeon Assistant for ten years. It wasn't until the COVID-19 pandemic hit that forced everyone to work from home, when one day she was scrolling through Facebook and saw the post about the launch program through Mother Road Market.

"My supervisor had asked if I was coming back to work, because my spot was still sitting there and I was torn," James said about her decision. "It was a hard decision for my family. It was choosing to fulfill my dream or go back to my 9-5 work schedule."

The day she saw the launch program posting, James said it felt like a sign from God telling her to do it. She had heard of people she knew who have applied for it before and they did not get accepted, but she moved forward and took a chance.

James also known as "Meat pie lady" has been selling meat pies as a side job since 2012 and it started in Tahlequah. Her daughter was into cheering at the time and was searching for funding for a cheerleading competition, so James sold meat pies as part of the fund-

pies," James said. "So from then on I started slowly making them more and more. I'd sell at powwows, and after a couple of years people recognized my face."

"Everybody loved my meat

to sell meat pies until the following week she received her acceptance call into the program. She had brought in some food examples such as "rez dogs," "skoden tacos," philly cheesesteak in frybread and others and the Kitchen 66 staff loved it.

"I always incorporate my frybread into whatever I'm making," James said.

As she begins this new journey in the Kitchen 66 launch program James is operating her new takeout kitchen called "Rez Served," a Native American/Indigenous based business located in Okmul-

The launch program was accepting 10 applicants for the spring and James was chosen out of over 300 other applicants. Classes for the program started in February and they meet in person every Tuesday.

"They help you launch your business from rock bottom and all the way up," James said. "It's a sixmonth training course program with so many benefits."

The benefits offered from the program consist of assigning the participant a business attorney to making sure the business is running smooth. The program also helps the participants with their sales pitch.

"I don't have any culinary experience, I just grew up in my grandma's and mom's kitchen and was put to work in there," James stated.

Her specialty is to stick to "grandma's kitchen" cooking such as homestyle and traditional on her menu. Since opening her "kitchen" and participating in the program, James feels like more doors are opening for her.

Rez Served is located on 620 S. Miami Ave. Okmulgee, OK 74447. She is open on Monday, Wednesday and Friday 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. for lunch and 4 p.m. until sold out for dinner.


